

Modal Verbs: Have to, Don't Have to, Must, Must not

have to/has to Must	- I'm working tomorrow morning, so I <u>have to</u> wake up early. - My mother is calling me, I <u>must</u> go now.
don't have to/doesn't have to	- It's Sunday tomorrow, so I <u>don't have to</u> wake up early.
must not	- This is a hospital, you <u>must not</u> smoke here.

Note: "have to" and "must" have the same meaning, but "don't have to" and "must not" are different. "Don't have to" means not necessary, "must not" means forbidden.

Pamela: Oh that's too bad. Is your boss working tomorrow too?

Mark: No, there will not be many customers tomorrow, so he **doesn't have to**/must not.
