“Weighing the Mayor” is a tradition in the town of High Wycombe that is what it sounds like. It is tradition to weigh the mayor at the start and at the end of their term in office. A crowd of people watches the weighing ceremony, and if the mayor hasn’t gained weight the crowd claps and cheers However, if the mayor has gained weight they are booed, because they have gotten fat at the taxpayer’s expense. The tradition began in the 17th century as a real tool to measure corruption, but today it is ceremonial.
