2. Read the conversation and match the underlined adverbs to their definitions below

Sue: I'm not sure I ever would. But I know you like a lot of hustle and bustle, so India would definitely suit you.

 **3. Read the description of the adverbs and make your own sentences about countries with each adverb.**

“Actually” is very useful to talk about common misconceptions. E.g. *“A lot of people think Finnish people are rude, but they are actually just very shy.”*

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“Basically” is good for making generalized statements about complex things. E.g. *“English politics are very complicated, but basically the South is more right-wing than the North.”*

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“Apparently” is a good way of saying “I heard this somewhere else; I am not responsible if this information is wrong.” E.g. *“My friend lived in Italy for 3 years, and apparently the people are lovely but the government is bad.”*

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“Obviously” is good for things that are very clear or well-known. E.g. *“Obviously China is a lot bigger than Thailand.”*

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“Definitely” is useful to emphasize that we are sure about something. E.g. *“I definitely preferred Hamburg to Berlin. Berlin was way too busy.”*
