Possessive Adjectives

We use possessive adjectives (my, his, her, your, etc.) to say something *belongs* to someone.

For example: "*My bag is green, but your bag is blue*"



Possessive adjectives go *before* a noun.

E.g. "*I drive my car (car = noun) every day.*"

The last 3 sentences (f, g, h) in exercise 2 have a possessive adjective in them. What is the possessive adjective in each sentence?

Objective Pronouns

The subject of a sentence is the person or thing *doing* something.

E.g. "She sends her a letter every year." "She" is the subject, the person doing something.

The object of a sentence is the person or thing being acted on.

E.g. "She sends her a letter every year." "Her" is the object, the person being acted on.
