Possessive Adjectives

We use possessive adjectives (my, his, her, your, etc.) to say something *belongs* to someone.

For example: "*My bag is green, but your bag is blue*"



Possessive adjectives go *before* a noun.

E.g. "*I drive my car (car = noun) every day.*"

Objective Pronouns

The subject of a sentence is the person or thing *doing* something.

Eg. "*She* sends *her* a letter every year." "She" is the subject, the person doing something.

The object of a sentence is the person or thing being acted on.

Eg. "*She* sends *her* a letter every year." "Her" is the object, the person being acted on.

The last sentence of exercise 5 has an objective pronoun. Which word is it? "... stay at home with *him*."
