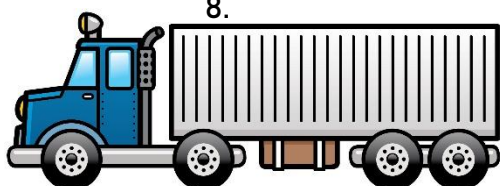

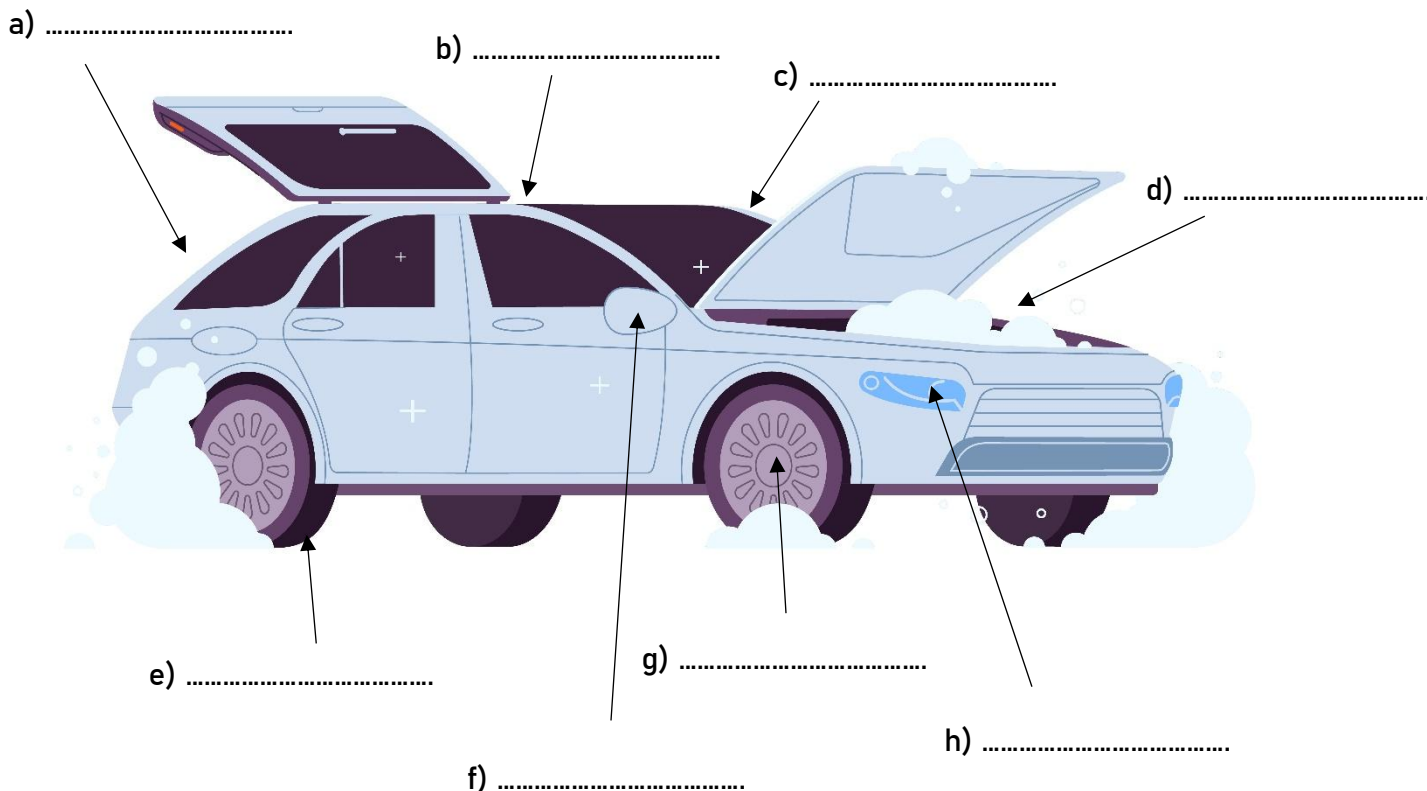

I would / I would not

The word 'would' is often used to say what our actions 'would' be in an imagined (not real) situation.

For example: "I would buy that car, that's a very good price." Or "I would not buy that car because it does not have air conditioning."

The structure is 'would' + 'base verb' (would + buy).

'I would' is often shortened to "I'd", and 'I would not' is often shortened to 'I wouldn't.'

For example: "I'd buy the motorbike." Or "I wouldn't buy the motorbike."
