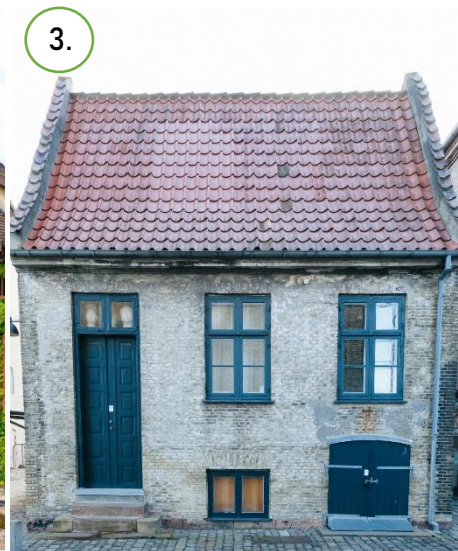
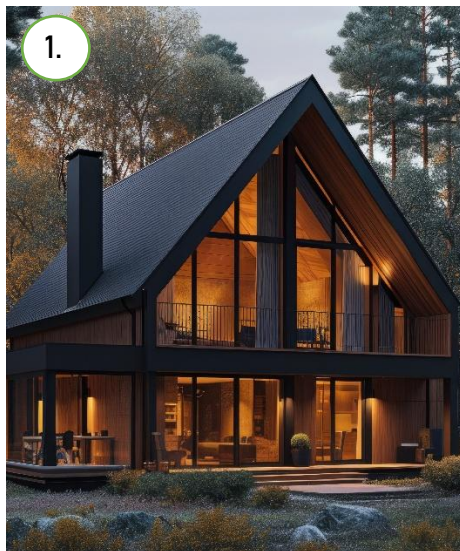



Discussing Personal Tastes

 1. Look at the houses and ask and answer the questions below with a partner.



- If you had to live in one of these houses, which would you choose and why?
- Are there any houses here that you think are ugly? Why don't you like them?
- Which house looks the cheapest, and which looks the most expensive?
- What does your house or apartment look like? Do you like how it looks?
- What would your dream house or apartment look like, and where would it be?

 2. Rank the houses above from 1 to 6 (1 = most beautiful, 6 = ugliest) and compare your list with your partner.



3. Read the conversation between a man and a woman trying to decide which house from exercise 1 to buy, then make 5 sentences about who likes which house and why.

Troy: I really want to buy the castle, it's *so* cool! I love old buildings like that.

Rachel: I'm sorry but no, the castle is my least favourite! It's *so* creepy and old, and it's in the middle of nowhere!

Troy: True, it is a long way from the city. The one with the black roof was nice, but that's a long way from the city too, so I guess that's out. Ok, which one do you want to buy?

Rachel: I'd like the 3-storey house with a pool and a garage, it's *so* beautiful!

Troy: I'm sorry but that one is way too expensive, and I would hate having *such* huge windows like that in the middle of the city. There would be no privacy! And besides, I like something a little more traditional.

Rachel: Like the white house with the weird roof? I'm sorry, but in my opinion that is *such* an ugly house. It's really not my style.

Troy: No, not that one, I like that one but it's quite weird. I think my second favourite was the little cottage, it was *so* cozy inside!

Rachel: That was *such* a tiny house! I would go crazy living in a house that size, I need space! And besides, we want to get a dog, and that place is too small for a dog.

Troy: It wouldn't be *so* bad, I think it could be fun to live in a cute place like that.

Rachel: I'm sorry but no. What about the one with leaves all over it and a cute little balcony. That's more traditional, so more your style, and I liked it too.

Troy: That one was nice... Ok yes, I could agree to that, I thought that place was pretty cool, and it has *such* a nice balcony.



For example: *"Rachel doesn't like house number 5 because it's creepy and old."*

So vs Such

'So' and 'such' can both be used to make a statement stronger, but there is a difference between them. 'So' is used before an adjective *without* a noun after it.

For example: "New York is amazing, it is so cool!" (no noun after 'cool').

'Such' is used when there is a noun after the adjective.

For example: "New York is amazing, it is such a cool city!" (the noun 'city' is after 'cool').

6. Troy and Rachel are discussing which sofa to buy. Read the conversation and make sentences below.

Troy: I love the purple leather sofa, I think it's really funky and would look great in our living room.

Rachel: The purple leather one? Really? I'm sorry but I think it's *pretty* ugly.

Troy: Oh, that's a shame. What about the other purple one? I think that one is *quite* nice.

Rachel: I'm sorry, I'm just not a big fan of purple in general. What about the brown leather one?

Troy: I think it would look nice in another house, but I think it looks too fancy for our house. On top of that, it's *pretty* expensive. What about the smaller brown one?

Rachel: Oh, that's my least favourite, it reminds me of a sofa I had in university, and it's *pretty* uncomfortable. My two favourites are the red one and the green one, but it's *quite* hard to decide between them.

Troy: Oh, that's quite an easy choice for me, I hate light green, it's my least favourite colour. Did you find the red one comfortable?

Rachel: Yeah, it's *quite* comfortable, and it's *pretty* cheap as well.

Troy: Ok, let's get that one!

For example: *"Troy likes the purple leather sofa because he thinks it's funky."*

Pretty and Quite

'Pretty' and 'quite' mean the same thing, and both make a statement softer, and are placed before an adjective.

- For example: *"I think the purple sofa is pretty cool."* (softer)
"I think the purple sofa is cool." (middle)
"I think the purple sofa is really cool." (stronger)
