### Student A

Miyake-jima is a city on a volcanic island near Japan, also known as “Gas Mask City”. The island is infamous for its harsh living conditions due to the active volcano. Since a massive eruption in 2000, the island has been continuously exposed to high levels of toxic sulfur dioxide gas, making it one of the most unique inhabited places on Earth.

Residents and visitors must always carry gas masks in case of sudden spikes in sulfur levels, and warning sirens are regularly used to alert the population when the air becomes too dangerous to breathe. Despite these extreme conditions, a small community continues to live on Miyake-jima. Adventurous travelers can visit and experience the haunting yet beautiful landscapes, abandoned buildings, and the surreal sight of people putting on gas masks as part of everyday life.



Venice, often called The Sinking City, is a picturesque floating metropolis built on over 100 islands in Italy. Famous for its canals, bridges, and renaissance architecture, Venice is a hub of art, history, and culture.

However, the city faces a growing crisis due to rising sea levels and unstable land, leading to frequent flooding. In the last hundred years the city has collectively sunk by 30 centimeters. The city has implemented a system of flood barriers to slow the sinking, but property damage due to flooding is common, and the problem is only likely to get worse. Despite these challenges, Venice remains a serene and magical destination, attracting millions of visitors each year.

### Student B

Auroville, often called *The City of Dawn*, is an experimental tiny town in India. Founded in 1968 by Mirra Alfassa (the unofficial mayor of the town), Auroville was envisioned as an international utopia where people from all over the world could live in peace, with very few rules and no government.

Auroville is a pioneer in environmental conservation, reforestation, organic farming, renewable energy, and eco-friendly architecture. Once a barren land, it has been transformed into a gorgeous green landscape through decades of environmental efforts. Over 3,000 residents from more than 60 countries call Auroville home. The town has no currency, and instead uses a unique economic system where residents contribute their work to the community and use an internal credit system.



Whittier is a small town in Alaska with a unique feature—all of its residents live in a single building! Whittier’s residents live in Begich Towers, a massive, 14-story former military complex built in the 1950s. The building itself is quite unattractive, but the Alaskan landscape around it is truly breath-taking. The building isn’t just an apartment complex; it also houses a post office, a police station, a grocery store, a church, a school, and even a medical clinic. This means that residents rarely have to leave the building, especially during the harsh Alaskan winters.

Whittier was originally built as a military outpost during World War II due to its strategic location. After the military left, the town remained, but with limited infrastructure. The remote location and extreme weather conditions, with strong winds and heavy snowfall, make it more practical for the community to live in one large, self-sufficient building.
